**VA Project by the Gardeners of
Greater Cleveland**

The Gardeners of Greater Cleveland has a long history of community garden service projects. The club has been the recipient of three "Gardening from the Heart" awards from the national organization in the past few years to help with those projects. This spring the club received the latest of those grants to assist with a project at the Spinal Cord Injury Unit of the Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center. The \$900 "Gardening from the Heart" grant was matched by an anonymous local donor.

The VA had some raised beds constructed that would be accessible by patients in wheelchairs. The request to our club was to help with the garden design, plant purchases and planting of the beds. The first step was soil testing. The soil was totally unsuitable for gardening but the Home Depot agreed to remove the soil and replace it with volunteer labor from their stores. The next step was developing a design and getting approval from the residents. We included both vegetables and ornamental plants.

The actual planting was completed on May 27 with the active participation of the veterans. The next steps will include supplying adaptive gardening tools for the vets, building a garden cart for their use and horticultural therapy sessions from the Cleveland Botanical Garden staff, paid for with local funds. This was a very successful and satisfying project for the Gardeners of Greater Cleveland thanks in part to the Gardening from the Heart Grant. Tom Davis, past president GOGC

News from Gardeners of Van Wert County Garden Club

At a time when we are struggling with maintaining an active membership, the Gardeners of Van Wert County Garden Club keeps busy. Our leaders, Dale and Marcia Davies, keep finding interesting speakers for our monthly programs. One month our presentation was on the lavender fields of France. Another month one of our own members gave a presentation on peonies, not only the care of the plant itself but also their history in Van Wert back in the days of fields of peonies and the parades that made thousands of people flock to our city. Another month representatives of the park and fair boards as well as downtown merchants and the convention bureau came to meet and brainstorm ideas for continuing the maintenance of the civic flower beds.

Our car pool trip was only a few miles away this year but no less interesting. Millie Ruen's several-acre lawn and garden, near Ottoville, were a big hit with our membership. Over the last 15 years she has turned a bean field into a work of art with trees, a pond, vegetable gardens, and, best of all, thousands of annuals. Millie starts all the

annuals from seeds in her basement, so she can “wow” all passers-by with brilliant colors of marigolds, zinnias, dahlias, and such. She is a firm believer in composting, and it certainly seems to help in the growth of her beautiful, weed free gardens.

Our chief focus every year is planting and maintaining public gardens throughout the city of Van Wert. Mother’s Day Weekend is busy as we sell fresh-from-the-green house annuals. Proceeds from the two days allow us money enough to plant hundreds of flowers. We are nearing the end of this project, not for lack of money BUT because our members are all retired and are physically no longer able to handle the kneeling, bending, and lifting required to take care of the beautiful gardens everyone has come to expect. How does a club get another group of volunteers to step forward?

Members of our club use the months leading up to our August meeting looking for gardeners who have brightened their “little corner of the county.” We have a camera in the car so we can snap a picture and note the address. As addresses of these especially pretty lawns are turned in, a committee checks them so we can honor them with Beautification Awards. Third year for our August picnic on the grounds of the Van Wert County Historical Museum, a beautiful setting for such awards. As usual, the recipients will be pleased that someone has noticed the care they've put into their yards, and our club will enjoy getting to know these gardeners and encourage them to continue making Van Wert an attractive place to call home.

Plant a Row for the Hungry



Gardeners of Greater Akron (GOGA)

Plant A Row for the Hungry - Purpose:

- To encourage members to plant an extra row of vegetables and donate harvested crops to the Akron Canton FoodBank or to similar organizations and churches in the area.
- Also to encourage donation of surplus garden vegetables and fruit to organizations providing food to needy poor.

GOGA Plant A Row for the Hungry Award -

To be presented each year to the GOGA member who has contributed the most pounds of fruit and vegetables. These are to be from their garden or from an extra Plant A Row added to their garden. Fruit and vegetables are to be dropped off at :

1. Akron-Canton Regional FoodBank or any of their designated drop off locations.
2. Churches with a food for the needy program
3. Other non-profit organizations with similar food for the needy donation programs.

GOGA members are to keep a record of their annual fruit and vegetable contributions each year and report to the GOGA Plant a Row committee before November 1.

Report:

1. Pounds of fruit and vegetables from your garden (your best estimate of weight).
Include names of fruit and vegetables.

Kathy's Kibitzin' for JAB
Fall 2014

I intended to follow the last two Kibitzin's for JAB with information about Integrated Pest Management. (IPM), but I'm so in love with Milkweed and Monarchs I decided to write about those instead.

Most of us in the Midwest are familiar with the Common Milkweed, perhaps the Butterfly weed and the Marsh or Swamp Milkweed. Last winter while looking for something else I came upon two sites of interest to me:

www.butterflyencounters.com gives pictures and information about many more milkweeds that grow across the United States. Their website is closed for the season, but you can find a link to Facebook and see the information there.

The other site is The Natural Treasures of Ohio. There you will find information of all the milkweed that are found in Ohio.

<http://floraofohio.blogspot.com/2013/06/a-guide-to-milkweeds-of-ohio.html>. So much native plant habitat has been eliminated from roadsides, neighborhoods, and fields, the monarchs and other insects that use the plants are suffering. I hope you will start an initiative in your community to increase the growing of milkweed plants of any variety.

While looking all around for everything milkweed and monarch, I've learned there are other insects that populate that particular plant. The monarch we know about; and now I've learned the queen butterfly does as well. I've added 3 pictures below for comparison. The first is a monarch (male); the second is a queen; and the third is a viceroy (often confused with a monarch.) The queen too lays her eggs on milkweed. Her egg, larva (caterpillar) and chrysalis look like the monarchs with the size of the chrysalis being smaller and a bit different hue to the color. The viceroy's host plant is willow and poplar

trees. The egg, larva and chrysalis are very different from the monarch and queen.



Other insects you might find using the milkweed as host are the milkweed tussock moth, and its larva
