HAYDITE

At a March bonsai workshop, Bonsai Master, Jim Nicora, stressed the need for good drainage material in each bonsai container. He introduced and used a material new to my ears.

Then at the CGLR April meeting Dennis James, the main speaker talked about rock gardening and the vital need for good drainage using a good stone and gravel-like base. Haydite? I thought.

These speakers peaked the interest that led to my researching this material called 'Haydite'. Following is what I learned.

Manufacturers produce Haydite by expanding and vitrifying selected shale in a rotary kiln at temperatures in excess of 2000 degrees Fahrenheit to pyro-process and expand clay, shale or slate.

The process creates Haydite sterile and environmentally inert. It is a natural, non-toxic, highly absorptive ceramic granule with a generally neutral pH. It is dimensionally stable and will not degrade or compress and does not need to be re-applied every year.

The end product is a strong and durable lightweight aggregate used in numerous types of construction throughout the world. In addition it has many other uses as high performance lightweight structural concrete and masonry units, landscaping mulch, soil conditioners and Geotechnical Fills

The product is graded large, medium and small. Coarse material is used in concrete, landscaping and other applications.

The micro porous internal structure of Haydite helps to free passage of air and water to root systems while significantly reducing soil

compaction. Thus, it maintains optimum moisture levels for vigorous healthy plants.

It is an excellent ground cover and mulch that will not fade, rot or easily blow away.

Haydite absorbs excess water during rain or watering, then slowly releases this excess water as the soil dries, acting in effect like a time-release capsule watering system. It is a concept that works equally well in gardening, nurseries, containers and turf cultivation.

Haydite was invented and patented by Stephen Hayde in the early part of the twentieth century. Today several companies produce and market expanded shale lightweight aggregate. One such company with plants in Ohio & Indiana are both within the CGLR - Hydraulic Press Brick Company

SAINT FIACRE DE BREUIL

'The Patron Saint of Gardens and Taxi Cabs'

Thought to be born with the Celtic name Fiachra he is debated to have lived from either, 600-670 A.D. or 700-777 A.D. and is claimed by both Ireland and Scotland. He joined the Benedictine monks and later went forth to France to preach Christianity to the heathen Gauls.

Tiring of the nomadic life he requested and was granted by Bishop Faro (Pharon) of Paris a nearby piece of forestland in Breuil. Fiachra cleared the land and began a hermit's pious life while skillfully growing vegetables, herbs, fruits and flowers.

Word soon spread about his great sanctity and gardening skills leading many common and important nobles to flock to him for healing their ills, comfort and spiritual guidance.

Nourishing visitors with food from his gardens and spiritual concern these strangers were readily blessed fed and sheltered. With his wise words he gave them comfort and peace of mind; sharing his garden harvests he eased their pain and cured their ills while passing on his knowledge and mastery of gardening.

Because of a miracle about how he acquired additional land to satisfy the needs of his growing visitors, he was elevated to Sainthood and became known as St. Fiacre de Breuil. Following his death a Benedictine monastery and shrine were erected on the

site. His remains are in the Cathedral of Meaux; he is also referred to as The Miracle Worker of Meaux.

During the seventeenth century and at the height of his popularity Parisians visiting his shrine in Breuil hired wagons and carriages to drive them from the door of the Hotel de Saint Fiacre to the shrine. It began the taxi driver's adoption of St. Fiacre as their patron Saint. Many to this day will display a flower or image on the cab's dashboard.



September first is considered his feast day. He is always shown with a spade in one hand and bible, trowel, flower or plant in the other.

There is a Statue of Saint Fiacre in the Shade Garden located at Fellows Riverside Gardens in Mill Creek Park, Youngstown, Ohio. You may check for him in your area or purchase him for your garden.

Don't confuse Saint Fiacre with Saint Francis the Patron Saint of Birds and Animals or as he is often considered the Protector and Guardian of Gardens.
